## Who is the best provider for your child?

If you are expecting a baby — or have children and are looking for a new provider — you have a lot of choices at Culbertson Clinics! Will you choose a pediatric or family practice provider?

Both a pediatric or a family practice provider can care for your child, however, many parents choose a pediatric provider. Pediatricians are physicians who specialize in the care of infants, children, teens and young adults up to age 21. Family medicine physicians have a specialty education in the comprehensive health care for individuals of all ages from infancy to geriatrics.

Courtney Elliott is a pediatric nurse practitioner at the Elmer Hugh Taylor Clinic in Beardstown, and treats patients from birth to age 21. She works with one internal medicine physician, one family practice physician, two family practice physician assistants and three family practice nurse practitioners. They all work together to provide care to people of all ages.

#### FIND A PROVIDER WHO WORKS WITH PATIENTS YOUR CHILD'S AGE

"Many of the family practice providers I work with do not see patients under a specific age, which varies by provider. They all prefer to focus mainly on the adult and elderly population, which I have chosen to stay away from. It works well as I often am able to start seeing the patient as a child and as they mature into adulthood, it is an easy transition for them to change over to one of our great family practice providers once they have become adults," Elliott said.

## Working with children was always part of Elliott's plan.

"While I was in nursing school working on my bachelor's in nursing, I knew I wanted to only work in pediatrics. I knew helping children and their families navigate the child's growth and development, along with their health, was the path I wanted to be on." She worked for six years as a pediatric nurse in many areas, before deciding to start graduate school to earn her pediatric nurse practitioner degree. She also continued to work as a pediatric nurse at a level one pediatric trauma center while in graduate school. "I had many excellent mentors between the nurse practitioners and pediatricians I worked with over the years," she said.

#### Both family practice and pediatric providers are trained to diagnose and treat illnesses.

"The main difference I feel exists between pediatrics and family practice is being specialized in pediatrics requires a large area of my education to also focus on the patient at all stages from newborn through adolescence," Elliott said.

## What does a pediatric nurse practitioner handle?

What's a typical day for Elliott at the Taylor Clinic? It's a mixture of well-baby or well-child visits, medication management check-ups for chronically ill children and children with mental health needs and visits for children who have an acute illness or injury.

Some sick visits are seen year-round, while others change with the seasons: In the spring and summer she sees things like rashes, bug bites, abscesses and allergies, while in the fall and winter she sees influenza, RSV, bronchiolitis, gastroenteritis, strep throat, URIs and pneumonia.

#### How to choose a provider?

"I advise parents to seek out someone they feel comfortable with. If they are not comfortable with the provider they pick for their child, the child won't be either," Elliott said.

"The No. 1 question I feel is important to ask is the provider's policy on vaccinations. Make sure it is in alignment with yours as the parents. Personally, I do not accept patients whose parents refuse to vaccinate their children with the school-required vaccinations. I have a few patients who cannot receive some of the required vaccines due to conditions they have and I will not knowingly place those children at risk. However, I do leave it up to the parents whether to vaccinate with the recommended but not required ones." "Second, I would ask what their scheduling procedure is. Having a baby can be a scary thing, especially when they are ill. My staff and I try very hard to accommodate patients who have a valid concern going on with a same-day

appointment. However, there are times parents may feel it is emergent, though we may feel it can wait until the next day. If this is the case, my nurses are very open to talking to the parents to explain or recommend things to try at home prior to their appointment."

"Children are a growing part of the patients we serve and we are excited to see how we will continue to grow in the future," said Mallory Moore, clinic operations manager at the Elmer Hugh Taylor Clinic, Rushville Family Practice & Community Medical Clinics.

## **Pediatric Spotlight**

## Is your child fully immunized?

If you have school-aged children, school physicals and vaccines are probably on your radar.

Several small changes in the guidelines for the vaccines recommended and/or required for school children were made last year, with most of the changes being minor. One vaccine has been removed from the recommendations and the number of doses of another vaccine for children with certain medical conditions has been changed.

Because the number of recommended vaccines and the recommended timing can appear complicated, a detailed chart can be helpful. Charts designed for infants, school-aged children, adults and special populations are available from the Centers for Disease Control website. In addition, charts are available in Spanish. Visit cdc.gov/vaccines to access detailed information, including downloadable charts. Of course, if you have any questions about your child's immunizations, ask your doctor or other health care provider.

The new guidelines are approved by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the American Academy of Pediatrics, the American Academy of Family Physicians and the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists. According to the Illinois Department of Public Health website: "students entering, transferring, or advancing into kindergarten through 12th grades will be required to show proof of receipt of two doses of mumps and two doses of rubella vaccine. In addition, students entering, transferring, or advancing into kindergarten, 6th, or 9th grades are required to

- Human Papillomavirus (HPV)
- Influenza
- Measles
- Meningitis
- Mumps
- Pertussis (whooping cough)
- Polio
- Pneumococcal Disease
- Rotavirus
- Rubella (German measles)
- Tetanus (lockjaw)

## Get to the bottom of foot pain!

Occasionally we all deal with painful feet, especially after wearing a new pair of shoes or engaging in activities we're not used to. But you don't have to be wearing high heels or other fancy shoes to suffer pain, especially if you have diabetes or circulation problems.

## Rod Schoonover learned that the hard way.

"I never realized the importance of wearing properly fitting shoes. Just wearing shoes that fit my feet has made all the difference in my pain," he said.

Lisa Downs, DNP, RN, Wound Clinic Supervisor at Culbertson Memorial Hospital, said Schoonover had a non-healing wound on the bottom of his foot. "In the midst of treating his wound, we discovered he had ill-fitting shoes. His foot was sliding and wouldn't allow for the wound to heal. Once we discovered the issue we had him go to a specialty shoe store and have his feet properly fitted. Rod said his feet felt so much better and his wound ultimately healed," Downs said.

"The staff at Culbertson has gone to great lengths to help me walk pain-free," Schoonover said.

#### The Wound Care Clinic at Culbertson

Downs is in charge of the Wound Clinic at Culbertson and also serves as the clinic nurse for Dr. Jeff Fleischli, the hospital's visiting podiatrist. Downs recently completed a wound certification course, which allows her to give better care and expands her knowledge of wound care, including foot wounds.

#### The most common foot problems

Dr. Fleischli, of Foot and Ankle Associates, said the most common foot problem he sees is plantar fasciitis, a condition many people refer to simply as heel pain. The pain is commonly much worse the first few steps of the day and is caused by tiny tears in the fascia that supports the bottom of the foot.

"It absolutely has something to do with the shoes worn. It's a combination of genetics, foot wear and the activities we do," Dr. Fleischli said. "Make sure you are wearing "Diabetic shoes have a toe box that is bigger," Downs said. "Dr. Fleischli refers a lot of patients for shoes."

#### When do you need a doctor?

How do you know when you need to seek a doctor's care for foot pain? "If it's not better in two to four weeks, or is worsening, seek treatment," Dr. Fleischi said.

Other common foot problems he treats include ingrown toenails, diabetic ulcers or problems requiring surgery. He performs

the proper shoe for the activity you are performing." After an evaluation and ruling out other conditions, he commonly treats plantar fasciitis with nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory medications, stretching exercises, shoe inserts and more appropriate footwear, he said.

#### **Prescription shoes**

Sometimes, just choosing comfortable shoes isn't quite enough, and prescription shoes are needed. Most private insurance and Medicare will pay for diabetic shoes and insoles, if the patient meets certain criteria. Neuropathy, certain foot deformities, or a previous amputation or ulceration all call for prescription shoes. elective and reconstructive surgeries in Springfield and Jacksonville for conditions including bunions, tendon tears, hammer toes and ankle instability.

Diabetics have to be especially vigilant about foot care. Diabetic neuropathy, the loss of feeling or improper feeling in the feet, can even lead to amputation. "Diabetes is the leading cause of non-traumatic amputation in the U.S.," Dr. Fleischli said. About 5 percent of his surgical cases are amputations.
